QUESTION: What does the above incident tell us about the strangers?

ANSWER: They didn't care about what is morally right or proper.

They had no conscience.

QUESTION: Is there a shorter way to describe the strangers?

ANSWER: Yes You can do it in one word: They were unscrupu-

Unscrupulous does the work of many words. It means "without a conscience," or "having no concern for what is morally right or proper."

The words you are about to learn, like unscrupulous, are words that describe people. For this reason, let us call them "people" words.
